This year, the festival is bigger and better than ever with an updated name and a new focus on Georgia pride. Shoppers will support the local


economy when they shop our antique dealers and artisans from Georgia.

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

RECENTACQUISITIONS by Christa McCay



One of the greatest pleasures of with working in the Museum's collection is within our textiles collection. This summer has seen our textile collection grow to include more items from the late 19th and early 20th century. One morning we were surprised with a large collection of fabulous women's dresses, intricately-detailed with seed pearls and embroidery. Beautiful ivory and cream colored dresses that were the height of fashion from the 1880s to the 1910s. Included with the dresses were ladies shoes to match. Many of these dresses were made for lavish events and gatherings.



A few weeks later we received another fascinating women's textile donation with fashions made to serve a much different purpose. Dresses and clothing made of black fabric made specifically for mourning. Dated from around 1915, these dresses are simple and unadorned.

To "top it off," a collection of stunning hats was donated by Museum Member Pam Flournoy. The hats (shown left) belonged to her mother-in-law, Myrtise Flournoy, mother of the late Mayor Robert Flournoy, Jr. Beautifully constructed with feathers, netting and faux flowers, these hats were a part of women's everyday accessories for many years.

All of the clothing that we receive represents an era gone by and the Museum thanks everyone for their contribution to our growing collection.
